### **IGCSE Economics FAQs**

### 1. What is the difference between business studies and economics?

Quite simply, business studies is **narrower in focus**. It concerns decisions made within businesses. It looks at issues on a business-level (e.g. what pricing strategy to use for a new product) and how businesses react to changes in the environment which they operate in (e.g. how some businesses have responded positively to the Covid-19 pandemic).

Economics is **broader in scope.** It looks at issues on a national/country wide level (e.g. the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on jobs in Singapore) and on a market level (e.g. how lockdowns affect the market for online streaming services).

### 2. Does the course require the completion of internal assessment/coursework?

The final grade for the course is 100% externally assessed, so it does not require the completion of coursework.

### 3. How much mathematics does the course involve?

IGCSE economics requires the application of basic arithmetic and algebraic skills. This should not be too challenging for students of IGCSE mathematics.

## 4. Is a lot of writing required in assessment?

As economics is a social science, it requires students to present extended written responses that analyse, assess and present reasoned conclusions on the decisions of businesses, governments and consumers; developing skills that are useful in future studies (see below).

### 5. Which syllabus is followed?

Economics follows the <u>Pearson Edexcel IGCSE Economics (4EC1)</u> syllabus.

# 6. Is it a requirement to take economics to study the course further after IGCSE?

No. IB Diploma and A Level Economics are both accessible to students that have not studied economics before.

# 7. Do I need to buy a textbook?

No. Students will be issued with a relevant textbook.

## 8. How useful is economics for the future?

Economics is extremely useful for students wishing to study social sciences at post-16 level and beyond. The course encourages the development of analytical and evaluative

skills. Students are encouraged to make decisions and justify them based on sound theory and evidence.

# 9. Can I study both economics and business at IGCSE?

This is not recommended as it limits the breadth of your studies. However, there may be some instances that it is considered on a case-by-case basis.

## 10. Help me! I still can't decide which subject I should take?

Choose a subject that will stimulate and retain your interest for the entirety of the three-year course. Have a look at the course content from each syllabus to see what topics are studied. Talk to any of the subject teachers to find out more about each course and/or to look at a textbook.

Don't choose a subject just because your friends are doing it or you have to choose 'something' in an Option block.
